A major new history of illustration that follows this artistic and professional practice across four centuries and through diverse traditions, cultures, and contexts For centuries, illustrators have worked in a wide variety of industries, including fashion, publishing, advertising, education, entertainment, science, food, interior design, architecture, and medicine. Although illustration shares the same fundamental visual language as fine art, it is

created as the result of a client-led brief, with imposed parameters and for an intended audience. In this visually lavish book, Andrew Hall presents a chronological, international survey of the history of illustration, revealing the broad connections of this discipline with technological innovation, political events, patterns of trade and travel, and cultural influences. Hall begins with the eighteenth-century political satire of Gillray, Rowlandson,

and Cruikshank, and continues through the early illustrated children's books of Greenaway, Allingham, and Shippen Green; the magazine work and advertisements of Mucha and Toulouse-Lautrec; the modernism of Lempicka and Cassandre; the countercultural images of Glaser, Douglas, Wilson, and Robbins; the late twentieth-century illustrations of Crumb, Baseman, Ware, and Pettibon; and the most recent work of Marjane Satrapi and Shepard Fairey, among many others. The evolution of illustration is also one of print culture, and Hall examines the technologies of intaglio relief, engraving, lithography, screen printing, and digital paper printing; as well as the application of illustration to areas such as botany, album covers, graphic novels, animation, gaming, and infographics. He explores the role of illustration in relation to the two industrial revolutions, the abuses of the slave trade and colonialism, the two world wars, and political activism; and the relationship between illustration, photography, and the fine arts. Sumptuous and comprehensive, *A Visual History of Illustration* offers a remarkable look at how artists have long created illustrated images to mirror and comment upon their times, allowing a way for others to consider and understand the world.

Examining how the rise of book illustration affected the historic hegemony of the word, Keri Yousif explores the complex literary and artistic relationship between the novelist Honoré de Balzac and the illustrator J. J. Grandville during the French July Monarchy (1830-1848). Both collaborators and rivals, these towering figures struggled for dominance in the Parisian book trade at the height of the Romantic revolution and its immediate aftermath. Both men were social portraitists who collaborated on the influential encyclopedic portrayal of nineteenth-century society, *Les Français peints par eux-mêmes*. However, their collaboration soon turned competitive with Grandville's publication of *Scènes de la vie privée et publique des animaux*, a visual parody of Balzac's *Scènes de la vie privée*. Yousif investigates Balzac's and Grandville's individual and joint artistic productions in terms of the larger economic and aesthetic struggles within the nineteenth-century arena of cultural production, showing how writers were forced to position themselves both in terms of the established literary hierarchy and in relation to the rapidly advancing image. As Yousif shows, the industrialization of the illustrated book spawned a triadic relationship between publisher, writer, and illustrator that transformed the book from a product of individual genius to a cooperative and commercial affair. Her study represents a significant contribution to our understanding of literature, art, and their interactions in a new marketplace for publication during the fraught transition from Romanticism to Realism.

First published in 1980, *Steel-Engraved Book Illustration in England* is a detailed and comprehensive survey of the steel engravings that were so popular in the nineteenth century. With an extensive range of illustrations, the book refutes the assumption that steel engravings are of little artistic value or

importance, a common attitude rooted largely in the connection between steel engravings and mass-produced books. Beginning with an exploration of the identification problems and early history of steel engravings, it moves through the production and printing of the plates and on to a study of several engravers and artists, as well as of the books themselves. *Steel-Engraved Book Illustration in England* will appeal to anyone interested in the history of printing and illustration.

Science and illustration have always walked hand in hand, and not only the scientific community but the general public as well have used illustrated materials since early history to understand natural phenomena. Moreover, from Galileo to Einstein, our modern history has been written with the key support of art and all the insights it contributes. The Western scientific revolution started in the 14th century and catapulted humankind into a completely new way of understanding how nature and the world around us behaved. From diseases caused by viruses to the vast galaxies of the cosmos, a new army of professionals turned their minds to starting to unlock and reshape the universe of our experience with a dialectic positioned between theory and evidence. The field of illustration and the development of knowledge became inseparably intertwined, as can be seen by the majestic works produced by both scientists and artists who specialised in this combined field. Many discoveries in science take place as the result of counterintuitive thinking, and in order to convey this to others or to the general public a connection has to be made with the resources of collective knowledge. Bearing that in mind, this book presents a broad approach, with illustrations that range from original sketches to technical drawings, and meticulous and colourful hand illustrations to computer-generated images. The scientific discoveries themselves cover the formal sciences (mathematics, statistics, logic and computer science), the natural sciences (biology, physics, geology, palaeontology and chemistry), together with various applied sciences (architecture, medicine and engineering). These are illustrated with numerous works by nameless and also well-known artists, such as Albrecht Dürer, who through his powers of observation is widely acknowledged as the founder of scientific illustration, establishing the discipline as an equal partner in the search for knowledge. At the other end of

this artistic timescale is the Chinese paleoanthropologist Qiang Ji, who in 2018 illuminated some of humankind's earliest history with his work on our ancestor, *Homo longi*. This XL-sized book highlights more than 700 scientists and over 300 discoveries that have all changed the course of history. From Andreas Vesalius to Charles Darwin and Marie Curie, the most important works of these pioneering men and women are described in detailed texts explaining their scientific contributions. The introduction to each of the book's chapters features in-depth biographies of the main characters from each period, such as Albert Einstein, Alan Turing, and Rosalind Franklin. Beyond this, the book also includes Galileo's watercolours of the moon, the first drawing of the heliocentric model of the universe by Nicolaus Copernicus, and Ada Lovelace's drawing of the first programmable calculator, the forerunner of today's computers.

century? and What impact did this publishing trend have on writers of literary and historical texts?
