Values clarification is compared and contrasted to other approaches to counseling and psychotherapy, including person-centered, cognitive-behavioral, reality therapy-choice theory, existential, individual psychology, solution-focused, narrative, motivational interviewing,

acceptance and commitment therapy, appreciative inquiry, life coaching, and positive psychology.
