novel that chronicles a cast of characters living in Texas creating dramatic encounters between modern life and mythology. While exploring a harsh but beautiful reality in a historical setting of small-town America, the narrative of *Little Hometown, America* shows the intricate details of multiple characters in their unique journeys dealing with love, death, family, despair, spirituality and friendship. The forty-year adventure of angst and alienation describes

the superficiality of society and tells of what it's like for one white-American, multi-generational Texan struggling as a boy, born crippled and poor, to become what some critics call an "everyman," (the L.A. culture critic Mary McNamara described the typical American "everyman" as being "male, white, Christian, physically able, mentally stable, financially sound and essentially kind,") all the while dealing with poverty and its shame, unexpected deaths of

close friends and family, and the challenge to love while trying to make an honest living from writing. Evoking suffering misfortunes and arousing sympathy, the novel *Little Hometown, America* reveals a saga based on true events of a boy growing up in a small Texas town in the 1980s and the man he will one day become to travel the world, which will lead to a self-awakening and fantastical end, like Holden Caulfield, in New York's Central Park.

Since its publication in 1939, countless would-be readers of Finnegans Wake - James Joyce's masterwork, which consumed a third of his life - have given up after a few pages, dismissing it as a "perverse triumph of the unintelligible." In 1944, a young professor of mythology and literature named Joseph Campbell, working with Henry Morton Robinson, wrote the first "key" or guide to entering the fascinating, disturbing,

marvelously rich world of Finnegans Wake. The authors break down Joyce's "unintelligible" book page by page, stripping the text of much of its obscurity and serving up thoughtful interpretations via footnotes and bracketed commentary. Campbell believed that society often confuses the literal and metaphorical interpretations of religious stories and symbols. Inci Bilgin Tekin's study offers a comparative perspective on two very challenging contemporary female playwrights, Liz Lochhead and Cherrie Moraga, and their Scottish and Chicanese adaptations of myths—such as the Greek Medea and Oedipus or the

Mayan Popul Vuh—which address ethnic, racial, gender, and hierarchical oppression. Her book incorporates postcolonial and feminist readings of Lochhead's and Moraga's plays while it also explores different mythologies on the background. Bilgin Tekin not only introduces an original point of view on Liz Lochhead's and Cherrie Moraga's plays as adaptations or rewrites, but also calls attention to the non-canonized Scottish, Aztec, and Mayan mythologies.

Following an innovative approach, she discusses the question in which ways Lochhead's and Moraga's adaptations of myths are challenges to the canon and further suggests a feminist version of Augusto Boal's Theatre of the Oppressed. The study appeals to readers of mythology, drama, and comparative literature. Those interested in postcolonial and feminist theories will also gain valuable new insights.

Occidental Mythology (the Masks of God, Volume 3): A Field Guide for Visionaries, Evolutionaries, and Revolutionaries The third volume in Campbell's monumental four-volume series, *The Masks of God*, traces the mythological underpinnings of Western religion: the shift from female-centered to male-dominated mythology. Once upon a time in the West, the focal figure of all mythology and worship was the bountiful Goddess

Earth. She reigned supreme as the mother and nourisher of life and as the receiver of the dead for rebirth. How, when, and why did this change? As Campbell here elucidates, She was more than a symbol of fertility; she was "a metaphysical symbol: the arch personification of the power of Space, Time, and Matter, within whose bound all beings arise and die." Campbell shows how the mythologies of the goddess were radically transformed, reinterpreted, and in large

measure suppressed "by those suddenly intrusive patriarchal warrior tribesmen whose traditions have come down to us chiefly in the Old and New Testaments and in the myths of Greece." Campbell goes on to describe the mythological underpinnings of Western religion -- Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Zoroastrianism -- and their historical influence on one another. No one who cares about history, mythology, or past or current events in the

lands from whence we came can do without this venerable yet remarkably contemporary analysis. Creative Mythology The Masks of God, Volume IV Ramsey Campbell is perhaps the world's most decorated author of horror fiction. He has won four World Fantasy Awards, ten British Fantasy Awards, three Bram Stoker Awards, and the Horror Writers' Association's Lifetime Achievement Award. Three decades into his career, Campbell paused

to review his body of short fiction and selected the stories that were, to his mind, the very best of his works. *Alone With the Horrors* collects nearly forty tales from the first thirty years of Campbell's writing. Included here are "In the Bag," which won the British Fantasy Award, and two World Fantasy Award-winning stories, "The Chimney" and the classic "Mackintosh Willy." Campbell crowns the book with a length preface which traces his early publication history, discusses his youthful

correspondence with August Derleth, illuminates the influence of H.P. Lovecraft on his early work, and gives an account of the creation of each story and the author's personal assessment of the works' flaws and virtues. In its first publication, a decade ago, *Alone With the Horrors* won both the Bram Stoker Award and the World Fantasy Award. For this new edition, Campbell has added one of his very first published stories, a Lovecraftian classic, "The Tower from

Yuggoth." From this early, Cthulhian tale, to later works that showcase Campbell's growing mastery of mood and character, *Alone With the Horrors* provides readers with a close look at a powerful writer's development of his craft.
