Brazil is a rapidly emerging country.

Brazilian theology, namely the Theology of Liberation, has become well known in the 1970s and 1980s. The politically active Base Ecclesial Communities and the progressive posture of the Roman Catholic Church contrasted with a steadily growing number of evangelicals, mostly aligned with the military regime but attractive precisely to the poor. After democratic transition in the mid-1980s, the context changed considerably.

Democracy, growing religious pluralism and mobility, a vibrant civil society, the political ascension of the Worker's Party and growing wealth, albeit within a continuously wide social gap, are some of the elements that show the need of a new approach to theology. It must be a theology that is both critical and constructive, resisting and cooperative, a theology that is able to give orientation to the churches, valuing and encouraging their contribution in society while avoiding attempts of imposition. The Churches and Democracy in Brazil, the fruit of years of interdisciplinary study of the Brazilian context and its main churches and theology, makes its case for an ecumenically articulated public theology. It seeks inspiration mainly in Luther and Lutheran theology, emphasizing human dignity, freedom, trust, the disposition to serve, and the ability to endure the ambiguities of reality, as well as a fresh interpretation of the doctrine of the two regiments.

These are the fundamental elements of what makes human beings full members of the body politic: citizenship, their right to have rights and to be able to effectively live them, together with their

corresponding duties, in a move of growing political participation conscious of their religious motivation in view of the commonweal.

We hold many assumptions about police work—that it is the responsibility of the state, or that police officers are given the right to kill in the name of public safety or self-defense. But in *The Killing Consensus*, Graham Denyer Willis shows how in São Paulo, Brazil, killing and the arbitration of "normal" killing in the name of social order are actually conducted by two groups—the police and organized crime—both operating according to parallel logics of murder. Based on three years of ethnographic fieldwork, Willis's book traces how homicide detectives categorize two types of killing: the first resulting from "resistance" to police arrest (which is often broadly defined) and the second at the hands of a crime "family" known as the Primeiro Comando da Capital (PCC). Death at the hands of police happens regularly, while the PCC's centralized

control and strict moral code among criminals has also routinized killing, ironically making the city feel safer for most residents. In a fractured urban security environment, where killing mirrors patterns of inequitable urbanization and historical exclusion along class, gender, and racial lines, Denyer Willis's research finds that the city's cyclical periods of peace and violence can best be understood through an unspoken but mutually observed consensus on the right to kill. This consensus hinges on common notions and street-level practices of who can die, where, how, and by whom, revealing an empirically distinct configuration of authority that Denyer Willis calls sovereignty by consensus.

Of the more than 40 million people around the world currently living with HIV/AIDS, two million live in Latin America and the Caribbean. In an engaging chronicle illuminated by his travels in the region, Shawn Smallman shows how the varying histories and cultures of the nations of Latin America have influenced the course of the pandemic. He demonstrates that a disease spread in an intimate manner is profoundly shaped by impersonal forces. In Latin America, Smallman explains, the AIDS pandemic has fractured into a series of subepidemics, driven by different factors in each country. Examining cultural issues and public policies at the country, regional, and global levels, he discusses why HIV has had such a heavy impact on Honduras, for instance, while leaving the neighboring state of Nicaragua relatively untouched, and why Latin America as a whole has kept infection rates lower than other global regions, such as Africa and Asia. Smallman draws on the most recent scientific research as well as his own interviews with AIDS educators, gay leaders, drug traffickers, crack addicts, transvestites, and doctors in Cuba, Brazil, and Mexico. Highlighting the realities of gender, race, sexuality, poverty, politics, and international relations throughout Latin America and the Caribbean, Smallman brings a fresh perspective to understanding the

cultures of the region as well as the global AIDS crisis.

Depois do best-seller *Estação Carandiru*, Drauzio Varella volta ao universo das prisões para mostrar ao leitor o outro lado da moeda: o cotidiano dos agentes carcerários. Livro que inspirou a série da Rede Globo. Em *Estação Carandiru*, Drauzio Varella focou seu relato na população carcerária de um dos presídios mais violentos do Brasil. Mas os 23 anos atuando em presídios brasileiros como médico voluntário também o aproximaram do outro lado da moeda: as centenas de agentes penitenciários que, trabalhando sob condições rigorosas e muitas vezes colocando a vida em risco, administram essa população. Foi com um grupo desses agentes que Drauzio passou a se reunir depois das longas jornadas de trabalho, em um botequim de frente para o Carandiru. E essa convivência pôs o autor em contato com os relatos narrados em *Carcereiros*.

Acompanhamos, assim, uma rebelião pelos olhos de quem tenta contê-la. Entramos em contato com o cotidiano dos carcereiros e as situações desconcertantes impostas pelo ofício, que eles resolvem com jogo de cintura e, não raramente, com humor. O que emerge é um retrato franco de um mundo totalmente desconhecido para quem está de fora, que também inspirou a série homônima exibida pela Rede Globo em 2018. Drauzio fala também de sua própria atividade como médico do sistema penitenciário: das frustrações, dos acertos e, sobretudo, da dificuldade em conciliar uma vida tão imersa nesta realidade com a de médico particular, apresentador de programas de divulgação científica, pesquisador de

plantas, escritor e pai de família. Se há algo de comum a essas vidas - carcereiros, médico, detentos -, é a dimensão humana que nunca escapa aos relatos do autor.

In Latin America, evangelical Protestantism poses an increasing challenge to Catholicism's long-established religious hegemony.
