**Teaching Students Creative and Critical Thinking - Minds ...**

Critical thinking is considered a higher order thinking skills, such as analysis, synthesis, and problem solving, inference, and evaluation. The concept of higher order thinking skills became well known with the publication of Bloom's taxonomy of educational objectives. Bloom's Taxonomy was primarily created for academic education; however, it is relevant to all types of learning.

Thinking skills - analytical, critical and creative thinking

**Critical Thinking vs. Creative Thinking - Key Differences.** Creative thinking tries to create something new, while critical thinking seeks to assess worth or validity of something that already exists. Creative thinking is generative, while critical thinking is analytical. Creative thinking is divergent, while critical thinking is convergent.

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Bloom's taxonomy classifies levels and forms of learning from the most basic level of recalling facts to the highest levels of evaluating and creating. When teaching material to students, the higher levels of learning on the hierarchy, which lead to critical thinking, are not utilized until the lower levels are achieved.
