The Futurist movement was founded and promoted by Filippo Tommaso Marinetti, beginning in 1909 with the First Futurist Manifesto, in which he inveighed against the complacency of "cultural necrophiliacs" and sought to annihilate the values of the past, writing that "there is no longer any beauty except the struggle. Charting the land they will inhabit, they find not a globe, not the iconic "blue marble," but a series of critical zones—patchy, heterogenous, discontinuous.
