Both Joseph K in *The Trial* and K in *The Castle* are victims of anonymous governing forces beyond their control. Both are atomized, estranged and rootless citizens deceived by authoritarian power.

Whereas Joseph K is relentlessly hunted down for a crime that remains nameless, K ceaselessly attempts to enter the castle, and so belong somewhere. Both novels may be read as powerful allegories of totalitarian government. In *America*, Karl Rossman experiences Oedipal and cultural isolation, and finds that "America" is never quite as real as it seems.

A Critical Study of Franz Kafka's Neglected First Novel W. W. Norton & Company

In Stanley Corngold's view, the themes and strategies of Kafka's fiction are generated by a tension between his concern for writing and his growing sense of its arbitrary character. Analyzing Kafka's work in light of "the necessity of form," which is also a merely formal necessity, Corngold uncovers the fundamental paradox of Kafka's art and life. The first section of the book shows how Kafka's rhetoric may be understood as the daring project of a man compelled to live his life as literature. In the central part of the book, Corngold reflects on the place of Kafka within the modern tradition, discussing such influential precursors of Cervantes, Flaubert, and Nietzsche, whose works display a comparable narrative disruption. Kafka's distinctive narrative strategies, Corngold points out, demand interpretation at the same time they resist it. Critics of Kafka, he says, must be aware that their approaches are guided by the principles that Kafka's fiction identifies, dramatizes, and rejects.

A Novel Schocken

Translated by Michael Hofmann. 'They come, you hear the scratch of their claws just below you in the ground, and already you are lost.' Strange beasts, night terrors, absurd bureaucrats and sinister places abound in this collection of stories by Franz Kafka. Some are less than a page long, others

more substantial; all were unpublished in his lifetime. These matchless short works range from the gleeful miniature horror 'Little Fable' to the off-kilter humour of 'Investigations of a Dog', and from the elaborate waking nightmare of 'Building the Great Wall of China' to the creeping unease of 'The Burrow', where a nameless creature's labyrinthine hiding place turns into a trap of fear and paranoia.

Karl Rossman has been banished by his parents to America, following a family scandal. There, with unquenchable optimism, he throws himself into the strange experiences that lie before him as he slowly makes his way into the interior of the great continent. Although Kafka's first novel (begun in 1911 and never finished), can be read as a menacing allegory of modern life, it is also infused with a quite un-Kafkaesque blitheness and sunniness, brought to life in this lyrical translation that returns to the original manuscript of the book.

A detailed documentation of Kippenberger's epic masterpiece Widely considered Martin Kippenberger's (1953-97) masterpiece, *The Happy End of Franz Kafka's "Amerika"* explores a utopia of universal employment, based on a section from Kafka's titular novel in which the protagonist, Karl Rossmann, applies for a job at the "biggest theater in the world": "whoever wants to become an artist should sign up!" Kippenberger's installation, set out on a stylized football pitch, is made up of 50 table-and-chair ensembles. Alongside classic design icons and found objects, it also includes furniture especially produced by Kippenberger, as well as pieces by numerous artist friends, including Cosima von Bonin, Tony Oursler, Ulrich Strothjohann and Jason Rhodes. This publication examines the work, and includes, for the first time, "biographies" of the individual objects, tracing the contexts of their creation, collection and integration into the installation. This volume therefore constitutes the definitive documentation of *The Happy End of Franz Kafka's "Amerika"*.

I have only one request," Kafka wrote to his publisher Kurt Wolff in 1913. "'The Stoker,' 'The Metamorphosis,' and 'The Judgment' belong together, both inwardly and outwardly. There is an obvious connection among the three, and, even more important, a secret one, for which reason I would be reluctant to forego the chance of having them published together in a book, which might be called *The Sons*."

Amerikafahrt by Wolfgang Koeppen is a masterpiece of observation, analysis, and writing, based on his 1958 trip to the United States. A major twentieth-century German writer, Koeppen presents a vivid and fascinating portrait of the US in the late 1950s: its major cities, its literary culture, its troubled race relations, its multi-culturalism and its vast loneliness, a motif drawn, in part, from Kafka's Amerika. A modernist travelogue, the text employs symbol, myth, and image, as if Koeppen sought to answer de Tocqueville's questions in the manner of Joyce and Kafka. The exhibition 'K' features Martin Kippenberger's legendary artwork 'The Happy End of Franz Kafka's 'Amerika', accompanied by Orson Welles' iconic film 'The Trial' and Tangerine Dream's late electronic album 'Franz Kafka The Castle'. Conceived by Udo Kittelmann as a coexisting trilogy, 'K' is inspired by three uncompleted and seminal novels by Franz Kafka (1883-1924) 'Amerika' (America), 'Der Prozess' (The Trial), and 'Das Schloss' (The Castle) posthumously published from 1925 and 1927. The unfinished nature of these books allows multiple and open readings and their adaptation into an exhibition project, that explored the novels' subjects and atmospheres through allusions and interpretations. As underlined by Udo Kittelmann, America, The Trial, and The Castle form a 'trilogy of loneliness,' according to Kafka's executor Max Brod. Seen in this light, we may also view 'K' as a triptych, an exhibition that resembles a tripartite, triple-layered picture. The structure is therefore

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similar to that of a traditional altarpiece, with America occupying the large central panel and The Trial and The Castle the side panels. The three parts can be read together as a remarkable allegory of the vicissitudes of life, or, in Kafka's words: 'All these parables really set out to say merely that the incomprehensible is incomprehensible, and we know that already.' Du, ich bin ganz beiseitegeschoben. Und wenn man immerfort als Hund behandelt wird, denkt man schließlich, man ist's wirklich. Gut, daß du da bist, Roßmann, ich kann wenigstens mit jemandem reden. Im Hause spricht ja niemand mit mir. Wir sind verhaßt. Und alles wegen der Brunelda. Sie ist ja natürlich ein prächtiges Weib. Du –« und er winkte Karl zu sich herab, um ihm zuzuflüstern – »ich habe sie einmal nackt gesehen. O!« Und in der Erinnerung an diese Freude fing er an, Karls Beine zu drücken und zu schlagen, bis Karl ausrief: »Robinson, du bist ja verrückt«, seine Hände packte und zurückstieß.
