She and Pearl have explored the country in their VW Rabbit with Mia's camera, living in dozens of municipalities before settling in Shaker Heights, here, Mia promises her daughter they will stay. Pearl, desiring to belong, quickly becomes a fixture in the Richardsons' home, involving her mother along with her. Witnessing these two families as they intermix and the clash is an utterly engrossing, often heartbreaking, profoundly empathetic encounter, not unlike watching a neighbor's house burn. And the exhibition doesn't stop with the Richardsons and Warrens.
