and such well-remembered comic
masterpieces as “Fresh Air,” “Some
General Instructions,” and “The Boiling
Water” (“A serious moment for the water
is when it boils”). And here are the
brilliant later poems—“One Train May
Hide Another,” the deliciously
autobiographical address in New
Addresses, and the stately elegy “Bel
Canto”—poems that, beneath a surface of
lightness and wit, speak with passion,
depth, and seriousness to all the most
important moments in one's existence.
