AN ALTERNATIVE TO THE METHOD

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. Renewal of Life by Transmission. The
most notable distinction between living
and inanimate things is that the former

maintain themselves by renewal. A stone
when struck resists. If its resistance is
greater than the force of the blow struck,
it remains outwardly unchanged.
Otherwise, it is shattered into smaller
bits. Never does the stone attempt to
react in such a way that it may maintain
itself against the blow, much less so as
to render the blow a contributing factor
to its own continued action. While the
living thing may easily be crushed by
superior force, it none the less tries to
turn the energies which act upon it into
means of its own further existence. If it

cannot do so, it does not just split into smaller pieces (at least in the higher forms of life), but loses its identity as a living thing. As long as it endures, it struggles to use surrounding energies in its own behalf. It uses light, air, moisture, and the material of soil. To say that it uses them is to say that it turns them into means of its own conservation. As long as it is growing, the energy it expends in thus turning the environment to account is more than compensated for by the return it gets: it grows. Understanding the word "control" in this sense, it may be said that a living being is one that subjugates and controls for its own continued activity the energies that would otherwise use it up. Life is a self-renewing process through action upon the environment.

Most acting books approach acting and directing from the Stanislavsky method which advocates arriving at emotions by "Affective Memory." This process asks the actor to use his/her own past experiences and graft them onto the

character. Stanislavsky himself later rejected this and said it "led to hysteria." *Acting Without Agony* offers an alternative to the method and teaches another way of arriving at emotions, which is described in detail throughout the text. It further maintains that acting should be fun and not a self-dissecting experience. This practical, step-by-step guide is organized into 18 lessons for achieving outstanding performance in acting and directing. It applies not only to the theatre, but to television and film as well. It is a true how-to book written mostly in dialogue between students and teacher. Through this format, the author is able to take the reader directly into the classroom as an effective learning aid.
