While not always employed in its traditional reconnaissance and surveillance mission, it successfully completed a variety of mission ranging from convoy escort to training of Iraqi soldiers. Then, after 43 years of serving state and

nation, Company F was inactivated in June 2011. At the time of its inactivation, Company F was the longest serving LRRP/LRS company in the United States Army. As Thomas Paine stated in 1776, "THESE are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands by it

now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman." The part-time professionals of Company F (RANGER) 425th Infantry never shrank from their duty. They answered their nation's call time and time again. It is in their memory that this history has been written. RANGE RS, LEAD THE WAY!

The intended audience is intermediate and higher level commanders, staffs of those headquarters, and newly assigned officers and NCOs of the ranger regiment. It is to be used with all other published US doctrine concerning NBC operations and the climatic or geographic influences on combat. The fundamentals apply to the employment of ranger units on worldwide operations

and across the spectrum of conflict from low to high intensity warfare. This includes all aspects of the integrated battlefield: nuclear, biological, and chemical. It is not intended to apply to the employment of long-range reconnaissance patrol (LRRP) companies, even though such units carry the designation "ranger." These LRRP companies, as well as the long-range surveillance company (LRSC) (corps level) and the long-range surveillance detachment (LRSD) (division level), are organized, trained, and equipped for long-range reconnaissance in enemy territory. The scope of this publication addresses the mission, organization, equipment, capabilities, limitations, planning, training, operations, and logistical support of ranger units. It describes how the ranger regiment and its subordinate battalions train, receive taskings, plan missions, task-organize, deploy, and integrate supporting elements to perform the mission. Once in combat, the ranger regiment maneuvers to accomplish the mission in the manner of other light infantry units. Ranger units make full use of published light infantry doctrinal guidance. This manual will repeat procedures or techniques

contained in other publications only if necessary for understanding or continuity. This publication does not contain everything the ranger needs to know to successfully execute a unit mission.  On 17 June 1970, in Mondol Kiri Province, Cambodia, the five men of Long-Range Reconnaissance Patrol (LRRP) Team 5-2 were about to halt for the day. A long-range reconnaissance patrol, or LRRP (pronounced "lurp"), is a

small, well-armed reconnaissance team that patrols deep in enemy-held territory. The true story of the 2nd Brigade, the 4th Infantry Division's small, ragtag "provisional" long range patrol platoon that was so effective it became the official model for 1st and 2nd Field Force MACV LRRP's covering the whole country, authorized by General Westmoreland. The 2nd Brigade LRRP's made

history. *Tiger the Lurp Dog* Presidio Press *Eyes Behind the Lines: US Army Long-Range Reconnaissance and Surveillance Units* is the 10th study in the *Combat Studies Institute (CSI) Global War on Terrorism (GWOT) Occasional Paper series*. This work is an outgrowth of concerns identified by the authors of *On Point: The United States Army in Operation IRAQI FREEDOM*.

Specifically, these authors called into question the use of long-range surveillance (LRS) assets by commanders during that campaign and suggested an assessment ought to be made about their continuing utility and means of employment. This revision contains some important additional information the author received after this book was originally published. Major

(Retired) James Gebhardt, of CSI, researched and wrote this Occasional Paper with that end in view. In this study, Gebhardt surveys the US Army's historical experience with LRRP and LRS units from the 1960s Cold War and Vietnam War, through their resurgence in the 1980s and use in Operations JUST CAUSE and DESERT STORM, to the advent of the GWOT. The paper's analytical framework examines each era of LRS units in terms of doctrine, organization, training, materiel, leadership, and personnel. In doing so, the author makes a strong case for continuing the LRS capability in the Army's force structure. The variety of environments and enemies likely to be faced by the military in the GWOT continues to demand the unique human intelligence abilities of trained and organized LRS units. As the Army leads the Armed Forces of the United States in combating terrorists where they live, the lessons found in this survey remain timely and relevant.
